From the Director of the Gardens

Plants of interest when visiting the Gardens this fall

While the Gardens at Kansas State University are full of wonderful plants to talk about, I've decided to highlight a few that visitors are drawn to this time of year.

The K-State Gardens are registered as an All-America Selections, or AAS, Display Garden. AAS is the oldest independent testing organization of flower and edible varieties in North America and select varieties that perform the best in the field. An AAS Display Garden gives the public an opportunity to view the newest AAS Winners in an attractive, well-maintained setting. Visitors to our garden are delighted to discover a variety of AAS ornamental peppers like 'Black Pearl' (*Capsicum annuum*) in the Lindquist family annual flower display beds located in the Debora Morrison Cottage Garden.

While there are several wonderful perennial plants performing well throughout the Gardens during the late summer and fall, the Japanese anemone, also known as windflower (*Anemone x hybrida*), is adding a pop of colorful blooms to a little shady patch. Look for them in the John Johnson Butterfly Garden.

Another plant in the butterfly garden that falls under the shady protection of our American elm (*Ulmus americana*) is a woody shrub called Oakleaf Hydrangea (*Hydrangea quercifolia*). The large white pyramidal panicles of flowers from the spring are turning a creamy purplish pink color, the large green oak-like leaves will eventually turn shades of burgundy, and when the leaves drop, the exfoliating bark creates another interesting feature of this great woody shrub. During your next visit to the Gardens, we hope you find these plants of interest and discover many others that make it a unique and enjoyable experience.

Conservatory update

The abatement, demo and site clearing has been completed. The original trusses and many of the original mechanical components have been salvaged and stored until they can be incorporated into a new conservatory. Arbor trellises were installed where the old north and south entry vestibules were located. The footprint will be planted with herbaceous plant material to provide seasonal interest until funds are raised and a new conservatory is built.



Reflecting pool update

After a long delay, reflecting pool construction has begun! The delay came when one of the subcontractors had to withdraw. A new subcontractor was found, but they needed to change a few pieces of the original plan before beginning the project.

September Stroll 2023

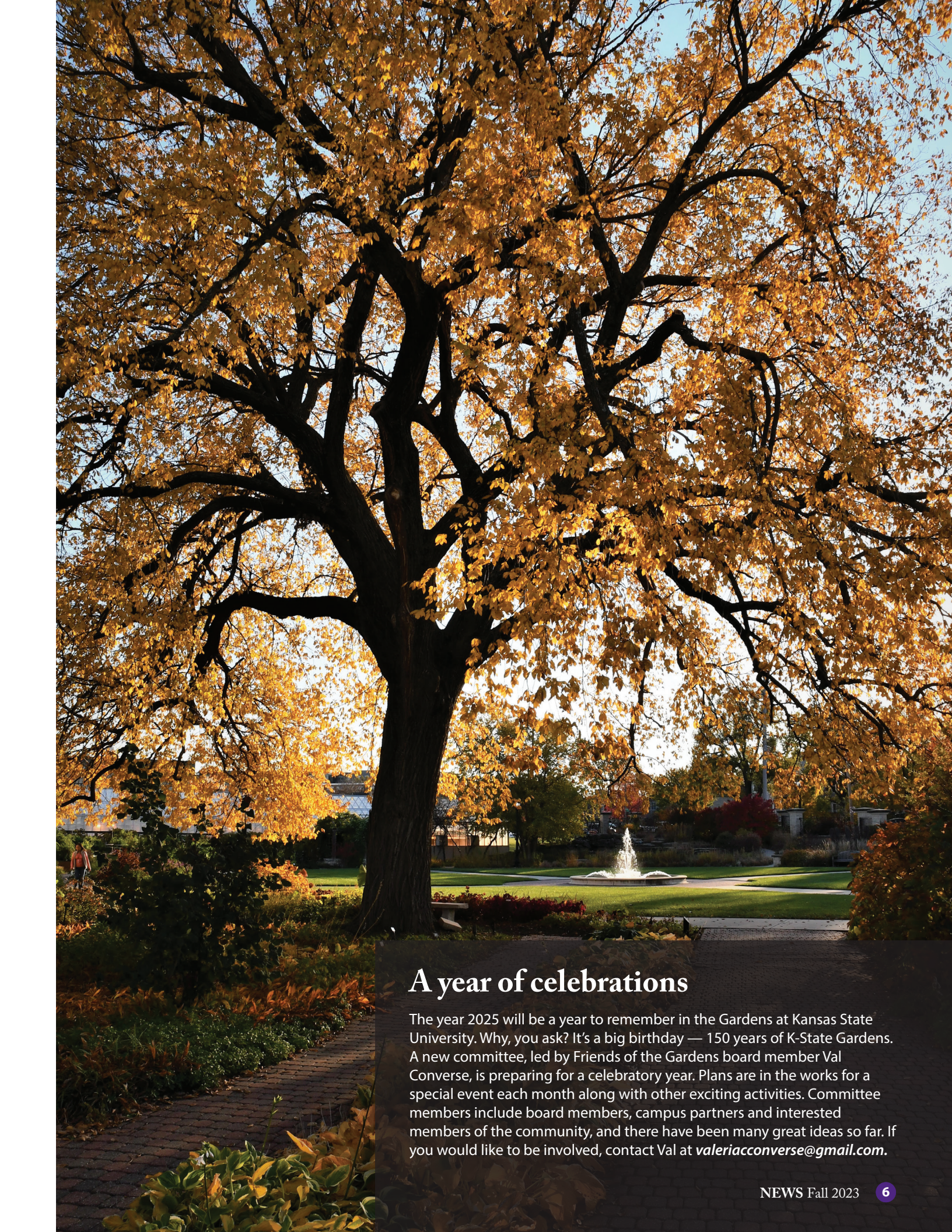

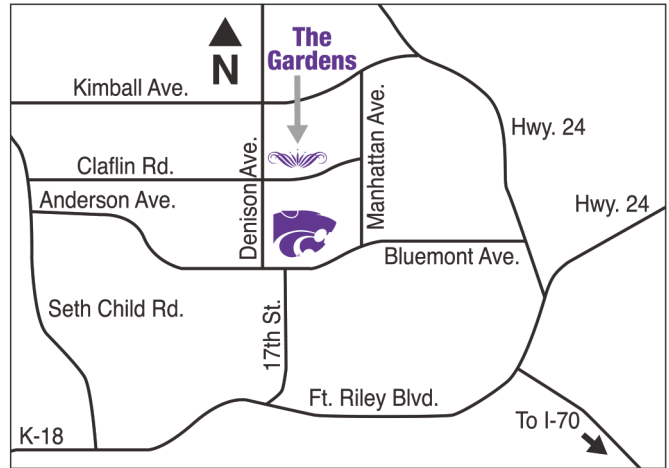
