- 1. President Andy Bennett called the meeting to order at 3:30 pm
- 2. Guest: Provost April Mason Topic for discussion: Budget and Enrollment Provost Mason welcomed the new faculty senators and thanked the outgoing faculty senators for their service.

Provost Mason first addressed student enrollment by indicating that June is the month for Orientation and Enrollment (O&E) for new students. At this point, we do not really know what the projections will be regarding enrollment, but will have a better idea in June when we see how many students attend O&E. We will not know the final fall enrollment number until the 20<sup>th</sup> day in September. Provost Mason also reported that the university will be seeking an outside consultant to help us look at the total Kansas State University enrollment (undergraduate, graduate, online, international, etc.).

Regarding budget, Provost Mason indicated the administration is watching Topeka with great interest. There is a tax proposal that would bring \$1 billion into the state of Kansas over the next two years. We do not yet know if this will pass. There are projections and suggestions from the legislature that include a 2% general use increase for salary merit. This would not provide funding for those on restricted use funds. There is also a proposal to increase state general use funds available to K-State and KU to counterbalance the increased budget cut that these universities received in comparison to the other Regents' universities. Additional updates regarding budget information from the legislature will be provided in K-State Today.

Provost Mason reported that the Budget Advisory Committee has put together different scenarios to be utilized depending on the legislature determinations. Deans and Vice Presidents have been briefed on these scenarios, but we do not know what the final budget cuts for the university will be until the Legislature finalizes the budget and tax bill.

A question was raised regarding exit interviews for faculty who are leaving and if there is a way to gauge whether or not faculty may be leaving the university because of concerns over conceal carry. Provost Mason indicated that exit interviews do occur and that Human Capital Services has data regarding why individuals left the university or retired, and that these data will be compiled and provided to Faculty Senate in the fall. Provost Mason also indicated that the next climate survey will take place in Fall 2018 in order to have a full year with the conceal carry allowance on our campus in order to be able to measure the difference in climate before conceal carry and after. Provost Mason is still hopeful that there may be an exemption to the conceal carry law for university campuses approved through the legislature.

- B. Faculty Affairs David Lehman / Charlie Barden
  The Faculty Affairs committee brought closure to the TEVAL discussion in the last meeting. The
  committee identified some best practices regarding TEVALs that they will post to the Teaching and
  Learning website. The committee will also provide two education components: (a) one directed
  toward students regarding the importance of TEVALs and working to increase response rates, and (b)
  one directed toward faculty and department heads to include best practices and methods to evaluate
  teaching other than through the use of TEVALs.
- C. Professional Staff Affairs Loleta Sump / Mary Anne Andrews Professional Staff Affairs analyzed the data compiled from the survey that was sent out to professional staff, and the report was presented to President Myers and Provost Mason yesterday. From this there were indications that there are two job classifications that are aggrieved: academic advisors and Information Technology Services staff. Professional Staff Affairs is advocating for these two groups. They also requested recognition or incentives for unclassified employees, similar to targeted faculty salary enhancement like faculty receive.
- D. Student Senate Jack Ayres Student Body President Ayres welcomed Jonathan Peuchen as the new Speaker of the Student Senate.

Tuition and Fees Strategy Committee:

 All of the college specific fee proposals were voted upon with the following results: Arts & Sciences, Engineering, and Human Ecology were voted down and students voted in favor of the Business College fee. The committee weighed numerous factors including the level of need and

- specificity reported in the proposals and the reasoning for requesting the funding to come from student fees. The committee identified dire need based on the College of Business fee and voted to support that course fee.
- O An academic building fee was passed, which will charge Manhattan campus students a fee of \$4 per student credit hour, which will go to pay off the internal debt to the Business Building and provide an additional \$1 million each year to go toward building upkeep. This proposal will now go forward to the Kansas Board of Regents for final approval.
- o The committee discussed tuition last Thursday and three major recommendations were made:
  - 1. A recommendation for tuition to be increased by no more than 3% for the 2017-2018 academic year.
  - 2. The committee supported the funding priorities set forth by the Budget Advisory Committee to provide funding for faculty and staff to include a cost of living adjustment, targeted faculty salary enhancements, and funding for individuals with salaries below the 25% market pay range.
  - 3. The committee supports the enhancement of Needs Based Scholarships.

#### E. Technology – Lisa Shappee / Michael Raine

Diana Blake came to the last FSCOT meeting to provide an update on the KSIS interface, which has a July 24<sup>th</sup> launch date. Persons interested in testing the new KSIS interface should let Lisa Shappee know and she will connect you with Diana Blake to participate in the pilot group.

The CIO search committee has met and been charged. The committee will work to have a CIO in place by September 1.

The university is accepting applications for a new Director of Identify Security and Compliance. The person in this position will help with the large number of phishing scams. There have been 1,000 compromised accounts since January.

### F. University Planning – Spencer Wood

FSCOUP will meet this Thursday and the committee plans to discuss the City University Fund Proposal to move forward with the USS and SGA in the fall semester. One idea that has received a lot of attention is the possibility of putting forward the Natatorium and Ahearn as a component in the City University Fund Proposal. This is something they will discuss further.

FSCOUP has invited Steve Martini to present information on the Health and Wellness plan.

Implementation guidelines for the furlough policy have been developed. The university is planning for the possibility of an emergency furlough if a budget is not in place by June 18<sup>th</sup> and we do not have authority to release funds to pay employees. There is a committee working to identify proper protocol regarding how this should be communicated and handled, if the situation arises.

#### 6. Announcements

A. Report on April 19 Kansas Board of Regents meeting

President Bennett reported that the Weapons Policy group presented to the Governance Committee regarding their proposals for restricted areas and adequate security measures on a temporary basis. The state law indicates that we can have weapons free spaces if there are "adequate security measures," specifically metal detectors with armed security officers. Regent's policy requires us to get initial approval from the regents for a space to be acceptable for temporary adequate security measures. After the initial approval, we just need to inform the regents whenever temporary measures are used (but don't need further approvals). The proposal K-State put forward included for

us to have the option to use temporary adequate security measures at Bill Snyder Family Stadium, Bramlage Coliseum, McCain Auditorium, and Forum Hall. Note that having approval to install temporary measures does not mean such measures will necessarily be used at any specific event. The athletic department is planning to purchase 70 mobile metal detectors to use at football and basketball games.

The AP exam cut scores have now gone to uniform cut scores across all Kansas Regents institutions. There has been some follow-up to the GED exams. A recommendation has been made by the American Council on Education to allow for a good score on a section of a GED to count as college credit. President Bennett followed up on this regarding the pre-algebra component and provided a recommendation for a good score to count as an entrance requirement for a student to get into College Algebra rather than to count as College Algebra course credit. President Bennett advised other faculty to look into other GED requirements to provide input.
