Statement about Faculty Senate—Shared Understanding for Shared Governance Laurel Littrell, Candidate for Faculty Senate President-Elect

Kansas State University is at a crossroads, along with much of higher education in these times. Declining state support, declining enrollment, budget constraints, increasing costs to students, and questions about value are issues that nearly all colleges and universities have been struggling with in the last years. Now, with the addition of dealing with COVID-19 quarantines and stay-at-home orders, institutions such as K-State with a strong residential presence must act quickly to rise to these challenges.

When the fire at Hale Library happened in May 2018, I truly could not anticipate that dealing with that catastrophe was, in many ways, a rehearsal for a greater catastrophe to hit nearly two years later. Once again, the K-State family has pulled together to work through the problem and carry on the mission of the university with creativity, resourcefulness, and commitment to excellence.

I have served K-State in many capacities in nearly 25 years of my employment here, including as a faculty member, department head (twice), interim assistant dean (2.5 years in duration), and in several capacities within Faculty Senate. As chair and co-chair of the Faculty Senate Committee on University Planning for the last three years, I facilitated a series of discussions with senators and committee members about the new budget model, familiarized myself with the university handbook—particularly in regards to budget allocations and financial stress situations, and listened to the work of the other Faculty Senate committees through my participation in Faculty Senate Leadership. My relevant skills include meeting organization and facilitation, listening, collaboration, and patience in working through differences of opinion and disagreements. I also greatly value collaborations with the other senates: University Support Staff Senate and Student Senate. The cooperation amongst all three senates brings perspective and strength to all, and I excel at bringing together different viewpoints and giving them a voice.

One reason I value my service to Faculty Senate so much over the last five years is the opportunity to become familiar with colleagues across campus and to work together towards a greater good. Learning diverse viewpoints and perspectives has been incredibly useful in comprehending how everyone contributes together to the success of K-State and its students, faculty, and staff, and how important we all are. As the university adapts in response to demographic and societal changes, including the crisis of the pandemic, it is imperative that we understand that we are stronger together. Listening to and learning from each other is a significant part of achieving this strength. As Faculty Senate President, I will be able to leverage my skills in listening and mediation to bring about shared understanding to enhance shared governance.
