- 1. President Elect Mindy Markham called the meeting to order at 3:30 pm and provided a land acknowledgement statement. We welcome Dan Ireton as our parliamentarian for today's meeting.
- 2. The October 8, 2019 minutes were approved as submitted.
- 3. Guest: Linda Cook, Chief of staff and director of community relations Topic for discussion: E-Scooters

E-Scooters, or Micro-mobility units, are on the rise and will be a part of K-State's future, therefore it's wise for faculty to be informed. Cook reported that a user will sign a contract with the vendor company via the app on their phone. Campus controls will include geo fencing and speed limits. It continues to charge the credit card if the scooter is not parked in the right place, so it minimizes the problem of abandoned scooters. In Sept. 2018, KS legislature banned scooters to stop companies from putting them on campus without going through the university. In Spring 2019 KS legislature amended the ordinance to allow use of e-scooters. Collaboration with KSU and Manhattan City Commission began in October 2019. Cook shared a PowerPoint presentation with senators that indicated campus regulators.

Scooters are unlawful on sidewalks, parking lots, parking garages, plaza areas in Aggieville and Downtown. There are many privately owned e-scooters, so we need to adopt a plan that works. Much of the lessons learned from the Oklahoma State University situation are related to pricing, pedestrian and rider safety, including speed and areas of use. Hours of operation are key to provide safety. These are not to be ridden in hours of darkness. Enforcement will be challenging, especially with privately owned/operated scooters. Liability insurance would be written into proposals from companies. Charging stations, utilizing lithium batteries, will not be in the dorms, reducing hazards of charging.

On game days these will be particularly popular. Therefore, designated parking will be provided, but not in the same parking lot where there are moving vehicles, and tailgating. The speed limit will be 8 mph in

congested areas and 15 mph in less congested areas. It's possible these will be shut down during Fake Patty's Day so working with the vendor is important. Map for usage will be similar to the bike path map.

Timeline: Dec 2019, pushout RFP; Jan 2020 Pre-bid meeting and vendor selection; After 2020 spring break e-scooters on campus. It's possible a three-month evaluation will occur after implementation and they will have the company assist in any changes necessary. Vendor is required to cover much of the expense, but there is some revenue, and this may go into the city/university fund for implementation of the plan.

Discussion: There will be no money to enforce the rules and safety is a concern. It was also clarified that Geo fencing does not stop the scooter immediately, it slows down until a full stop. Could the fees recovered be used to create an ecological/environmentally cognizant program? There are issues of accessibility with respect to scooters being dropped off by doors of the building, and concern of students getting concussions or being hit from use of the machine.

- 4. Approval of consent agenda (page 6-8) Von Bergen (includes **Attachments 1-2**)
 Senator Von Bergen inquired if any items from the consent agenda needed moved to the discussion agenda. Seeing none, the consent agenda was approved as submitted.
- 5. Report from Standing Committees and Student Senate
 - A. Academic Affairs Todd Easton/Don Von Bergen
 - Proposed revision to standard class meeting time (Summer) Attachment 3

Senator Easton directed attention to attachment 3. He moved approval of the revised Summer School Standard Class Meeting Times policy. CAPP (Committee on Academic Policies and Procedures) put forward the proposed summer schedule to be included with the existing policy. Senator Dunn would be happy to answer questions. Motion carried. Proposed revision is approved.

Senator Easton thanked Academic Affairs committee members for their hard work on the volume of the proposals submitted this semester.

Discussion agenda (page 9) (Includes Attachments 4-7)

Senator Easton moved to send the minor in Middle East Studies back to Academic Affairs committee upon the request of the proposing department because it was discovered further edits were required. Motion carried. Once edits are made and AAC approves it will come back to Faculty Senate.

Senator Easton moved approval of two new minors, one in Gerontology and the other in Psychology. No discussion. Motion carried.

Senator Easton moved approval of the two new certificates. Supplemental details can be found in Attachment 5. Academic Affairs decided that having new certificates listed as part of the discussion agenda at Faculty Senate meetings gives them more visibility. Motion carried.

Senator Easton moved approval of the new BS degree in Integrative Physiology. Supplemental details can be found in Attachment 6. Discussion: There was a question raised about the hour requirement from KBOR in Chapter III of their procedures manual and whether the degree meets this. This wasn't related to the full degree hours of 120, but rather the major within it. After double

checking the hours, it was found the degree meets requirements. After further conversation the Motion carried.

Senator Easton moved approval of the new BS in Public Health and associated courses. Additionally, on behalf of AAC, he moved approval of the proposed amendment to the degree. Supplemental details can be found in Attachment 7. A request has been made by a senator for a secret ballot vote for this item. Senator Easton and President Elect Markham shared with senators the actions that precipitated this request.

Senator Easton provided detailed background to senators about this proposal. It came to Faculty Senate attention in September where there was a concern addressed regarding duplication of courses. AAC had discussed and determined this is not an interdisciplinary degree and therefore it followed the appropriate approval path. After the departments continued discussion, they arrived at an amendment, adding the two classes under discussion and a mass communications class to their electives. The degree came before Exec and was approved for placement on the Faculty Senate agenda (15-7). An additional amendment was proposed to drop the number of free electives from 32 to 30, depending on which track you follow, and to include BIOL 330 in the core courses. This amendment was approved by Academic Affairs unanimously and is what is now being presented to senators for a vote.

Several guests were present from Health and Human Sciences (HHS) to respond to questions as needed including Craig Harms and Katie Heinrich.

Discussion on the motion:

The process was followed; however, it was believed that until HHS was forced to talk to other units, they did not. It was inquired where biology or chemistry are in the degree. Climate science is important in public health, so physics was inquired about as well. AAC invited several guests in order to assist in addressing questions. Katie Heinrich was acknowledged and responded that there are five core areas of Public Health in this curriculum. These include the basics of public health for accreditation, and also provide enough electives to allow students to have the flexibility to specialize and include Chemistry or Biochemistry. It would also be an advising focus to guide students.

Another concern was raised about prerequisites not being included in the program and that "First Generation" students will not know what is needed to pursue this track if they are not in the plan of study. Easton responded that it is assumed that prerequisites will be taken, therefore they are not listed.

A statement was made by another senator that environmental health also relies on chemistry and it appears to be a weakness in the curriculum to not have this required.

The conversation turned to the believed overlap in Env Health and Env Quality and the objection from the Agronomy department.

Lengthy conversation continued on the impact of enrollment, the difference between this degree and other degrees from other regents' institutions, not wanting our university to take a cannibalistic approach, ie. taking students from different degrees, and so on.

Senator Easton reported that the goal of the program is to establish a degree, and continue to add specialties.

After continued lengthy discussion and other various comments about collaboration a motion was made by Heatherman and seconded by Senator Easton to call the question. Motion carried 65-15.

As stated previously, the Faculty Senate bylaws allow for a secret ballot to be called for by a senator and one has been requested.

This vote is to approve the degree, with the amendments. Those voting by zoom will relay their vote to Candace and she will fill out a ballot.

The vote on the degree resulted in non-approval.

C. Professional Staff Affairs – Maria Beebe/Kelly Briggs

The Docking institute surveys are on the professional Staff Affairs website, they will be presented at KBOR on Dec 12. They are working with Communications & Marketing to put together listening tours across campus to get feedback. Also partnering with HCS to educate campus with the new competencies framework that has been purchased. Jeff Barnes, parking services director, explained the three tiers of parking fees, and what that would look like with an adjustment respecting salary levels to provide equitable parking prices. On Nov. 19th the DMV will have mobile Driver's license Real ID booth available on campus.

D. Student Senate – Hannah Heatherman

Long term financial planning is ongoing. Pending Student Senate approval, continuances will be given to Student legal services, wildcat watch, and the Center for Student Involvement. The fine arts fee was decreased in committee by \$23,600 which means a cut of 20% with cuts to McCain, APD, Art Department and student organizations, \$40,000 reserves will be taken from that account. The Tuition and Fees Strategies committee is reviewing engineering fees (existing, not new proposal).

President Elect Markham announced that Tara Coleman was approved by the Executive Committee as the replacement for Sonya Lutter, who could not complete her term as ombudsperson.

 President Elect Markham directed attention to the link and requested feedback to be provided to President González by November 15th.

7. Open discussion period for senators as needed

Senator Barrett reminded senators of the vote related to fall break earlier this semester that did not pass and reported that to date we have had 360 students of concern, two suicides, and at times a wait list of up

to 6 hours for a student to see an emergency counselor. Barrett invited those interested in this topic to attend a meeting on Nov. 21 at 10 am in the CSI conference room for continued discussion.

Senator Easton reported that a classroom upgrade in Engineering has resulted in an unusable classroom size for them. Littrell, who serves on the classroom planning committee, thanked him for the feedback and will work with that committee to make consequences known to those interested in upgrading the classrooms in their building.

Senator Korten reported that the campus map no longer shows logos of the buildings, which has resulted in many emails from students who were seeking exam rooms.
