Donald A. Saucier, Ph.D. Statement of Candidacy for Faculty Senate President

I am Don Saucier and I teach at K-State. If you have seen the videos we have produced at the Teaching & Learning Center, then you have probably heard me say this before. This is our tagline. We selected this tagline because it has meaning. I enjoy my job and find fulfillment in doing it. I see my job as optimizing the experiences of being at K-State for my students, my colleagues, and myself, which is why I want to serve as President of Faculty Senate.

My path to K-State began with me being a first-generation college student from a lower-class background at an elite liberal arts school that I attended only because I received athletic grants. While feeling out of place socially, I also felt supported personally and professionally by the faculty who taught my classes. Sharing with them that I wanted to enjoy the same experiences they did in teaching and empowering students, they mentored me in undergraduate research and in my applications to graduate school. After earning my M.A. and Ph.D. in Psychology at the University of Vermont, I met the realities of the academic job market, literally receiving 41 rejections from my 40 applications to tenure-track jobs. Consequently, I spent three years at the University of Kentucky in a term position as an instructor/lecturer. I came to K-State as a tenure-track Assistant Professor in 2004 where I have since been promoted to Associate Professor with tenure, named a University Distinguished Teaching Scholar, and promoted to Full Professor.

Having been at K-State for 17 years, I am aware that not everyone feels the fulfillment that I do in my job. Not everyone has the support, representation, recognition, validation, and compensation they deserve as they contribute to K-State's missions in teaching, RSCAD, and community engagement as a land grant institution. My teaching and research interests have always aligned with my commitment to social justice and equity, and I am committed to promoting social justice and equity in my role as Faculty Senate President here at K-State. I have contributed to these efforts through presentations and workshops given at KSUnite and in the Difficult Dialogues series produced by former Chief Diversity and Inclusion Officer Dr. Bryan Samuel and through my service on the Faculty Senate Ad Hoc Committee on Social Justice. I have worked on the Climate Survey team and its focus groups and heard the concerns about inequity at our institution. I have co-chaired Faculty Affairs in our efforts to protect us and our colleagues from receiving backlash in their evaluations due to their managing COVID-19 challenges while investing heroic efforts to keep our university running; to create representation for term employees in Faculty Senate; to expand the dependent tuition benefit for term employees; and in our creation of syllabus statements to affirm our commitment to mutual respect and inclusion in K-State teaching and learning spaces.

Each of these efforts came as a result of my collaboration with amazing and innovative colleagues in the spirit of shared governance. We work together for the common good. As a teacher, I work to bring PEACE to my classes (Saucier, 2019; Saucier & Jones, 2020). This is an acronym standing for Preparation, Expertise, Authenticity, Caring, and Engagement. As Faculty Senate President I will bring preparation, authenticity, caring, and engagement to continue to work alongside each of you in our mutual commitment to optimizing the experiences of being at K-State for all faculty, staff, and students. I look forward to advocating for faculty, staff, and students at K-State as Faculty Senate President by amplifying our collective voice.
