Distribution requirements apply exclusively to dual degree seeking students. They may not be applied to dual majors within the College of Arts and Sciences.

The Duel degree program is designed for those students entering the University Fall 2013 and forward.

Dual degree seeking BA students must fulfill the requirements for the College of Arts and Sciences listed under Additional Requirements of the BA, except for the Mathematics requirement. They must fulfill all the requirements in at least one of the three other areas (Humanities, Social Science, or Natural Science) and half of the distribution requirements in the remaining two areas. The choice of how these requirements will be met will be made with the approval of an advisor within the College of Arts and Sciences.

Dual degree seeking BS students must fulfill all the requirements for the College of Arts and Sciences in at least two of the four required areas (Humanities, Social Science, Natural Science, and Additional Requirements of the BS), and half of the distribution requirements in the remaining two areas. The choice of how these requirements will be met will be made with the approval of an advisor within the College of Arts and Sciences.

Dual degree seeking students must meet the International Studies Overlay requirement.

Half of the distribution requirements in each area are:

## Humanities

One course from Philosophy (3 credits) and one course in the Fine Arts, Western Heritage, or Literary or Rhetorical Arts (3 Credits).

Dual degree seeking students enrolled in Biochemistry and Molecular Physics, Biology, Chemistry, Geology, Mathematics, Physics, Physical Sciences, Natural Sciences, or Statics, are required to take PHILO 501: Perspectives on Science to meet the Philosophy requirement.
